> **1966 Seagrave Fire Engine** By Peter W. Pandolfi

The year was 1966. The Beatles were singing "Yellow Submarine" on the radio, TV shows Star Trek and Batman made their debuts, and Pampers disposable diapers were made available to the public. It was also a big year for the Town of Manassas, Virginia. Yes, I said town as Manassas did not become a city until 1973. As a town it operated under the auspices if Prince William County of which

Manassas was the county seat. Expanding its emergency services, the Greater Manassas Volunteer Rescue Squad was established with its station being build on Center St. near the courthouse on land donated by the Merchant family. The town purchased a 1966 International Harvester carry all ambulance, dubbed Creamy due to its color, which the Squad still owns to this day and brings to our annual Rohr car show. It was in this year that the County decided to put a 1966 Seagrave ladder truck on the west end of the County. The Manassas Volunteer Fire Company followed suit by retiring its 1939 Chevrolet fire engine for a 1966 Seagrave fire engine to match with the ladder truck. A little fire apparatus nomenclature: a fire engine is a vehicle that contains a water pump and usually a water tank, hose and one or two small ladders. A fire truck is a vehicle which carries an assortment of ladders, an aerial ladder (75 feet or over) and a wide range of tools used for ventilation and search and rescue.

### Car of the Month continued

The new Seagrave engine was originally all red as was the ladder truck. Since the town purchased the engine, it had only Manassas markings while the ladder truck had Prince William County markings. In keeping with tradition, fire engines had to be red in color and have a bell in addition to its lights and sirens. Not a legal requirement, just tradition. This unit was an open cab variety, which was determined to be too unsafe in the mid-1970s and coveted by

collectors today. To be clear, it was not a convertible. You rode exposed to the elements and the windshield wipers were on both the outside and inside of the windshield glass. If it bothers you to get wet, you are in the wrong job.

The Seagrave originally came with a 12 cylinder, gasoline engine with, I am told, an intoxicating exhaust note. While very capable, this engine was replaced due to the continual maintenance required to keep the carburetors in sync and having the engine run properly. The replacement was a six cylinder Detroit diesel engine, also producing a distinctive exhaust note, that was highly reliable and easier to maintain. Another feature of this vehicle that was banned in the 1970s was the accommodation for back step riders. The iconic picture of an engine racing to the scene of a fire has fire fighters in the cab, in the bucket seats behind the front seats and fire fighters standing up on the back step holding on as the unit careened through the streets. It even has a buzzer system for the back step fire fighters to signal the driver.

This engine is termed a triple combination pumper since it carries its own water supply, the pump and needed hoses. The water tank has a capacity of 500 gallons and the pump can feed water at the rate of 500 gallons per minute. For smaller fires, 500 gallons is more that enough water, but the engine has water intakes on both sides and the front. Water sources can include hydrants, other fire engines natu-

ral water sources such as a lake or stream and swimming pools. The large, black hoses on the left side of the hose bed are called hard sleeves and are used for drawing water from these other water sources. They are rigid hoses since the pump has to suck up the water into its system. Flexible hoses would collapse under the suction. This engine remained in front line service for 33 years and was considered the most reliable engine out of the four engines operated by the Fire Company.

**The National Beat**

The following article entitled "<u>History of Auto Touring—Celebrating Women in History"</u> was written by Jeff Broadus, AACA Vice President—Marketing. It was originally published in the Spring 2022 Rummage Box. I hope you all enjoy it.

They say behind every good man is a good woman. Did you know the first documented trip in a motorized vehicle was completed by a woman, not a man? Thanks to the absolute confidence of Bertha Benz in her husband and his invention. Karl Benz continued his work regardless of repeated setbacks. On January 29, 1886 his efforts were crowned with success: Karl Benz filed a patent application for his three-wheeled "vehicle powered by a gas engine". The world's first long distance automobile journey, of sixty-two miles, was completed by Bertha Benz (wife of Karl Benz), inventor of the three-wheeled Patent motor car in 1888. The trip had proven the safety of the automobile for travel. Although the automobile was still a novelty in America, Europeans were beginning to venture out in motorized vehicles. In doing so, they explored and considered several factors that influenced their routes and stops along the way. Important considerations included where fuel was available, what if the car required maintenance or needed repairs or what do to do to resolve something as simple as a flat tire. Touring today takes into consideration many of the same factors. Today, tour groups around the world must consider, maintenance of vehicles on the tour, fuel, accommodations, meals and entertainment. As early as 1910, several auto clubs had been established in both the United States and Abroad to support and promote these efforts. These clubs worked to improve driving conditions, pass safety laws, map desirable driving routes and, of course promote touring. How can the AACA support your touring efforts? Let us know.

#### June Meeting Presentation

At our June meeting, Pete Pandolfi entertained us with the first of two presentations on the history of Rolls-Royce motorcars. Pete first fell in love with Rolls-Royce at the New York Auto Show when he was six years old. Ever since that time he has studied and collected numerous items of this storied marque. He has been a member of the Rolls-Royce Owners Club since 1991 and in 2019 he bought his first, and most likely last, actual Rolls-Royce motorcar. This first presentation covered the formative years of the company taking us for a ride up to the end of World War II.

Rolls-Royce was first conceived by a meeting of a middle class engineer, Frederick Henry Royce, and a wealthy aristocrat, Honorable Charles Stuart Rolls, in 1904. Royce was the founder and owner of a successful manufacturing company producing high quality electric cranes, winches and generators. Rolls, the son of a British Lord, operated an automotive sales company importing French Panhard cars and selling them to wealthy clients. Rolls was constantly looking for a British made, high quality car to sell. Royce, disappointed with a French car he purchased, was displeased with the quality and reliability. So he reengineered the car to create his own car with emphasis on quality and reliability. Claude Johnson, Rolls' business manager, convinced Rolls to check out the new Royce car. Despite their age difference, Royce being the elder, the two found common ground and they agreed to form the Rolls-Royce motorcar company with Royce building the cars and Rolls selling them.

The endeavor proved very successful with Rolls selling every vehicle Royce could make. We learned that there several changes over the three and a half decades before the war. The double "R" logo adorned all

Rolls-Royce cars beginning in 1904. The Spirit of Ecstasy mascot made it appearance in 1911 and became standard issue in 1913 With the coming of World War I, Rolls-Royce began making engines for airplanes and converted its acclaimed Silver Ghost model into an armored personnel carrier for the British Army. The vehicles were most famously used by T.E. Lawrence, Lawrence of Arabia, in his desert campaign.

After WWI, the company continued to make and upgrade its aero engine endeavor and branched out into making marine engines, which set several water speed records in the early 1930s. It also continued making high quality vehicles for wealthy clients. In 1921, the motorcar division expanded its production to a facility

in Springfield, Massachusetts in the United States. These Springfield cars were build from the same materials and were of the same qualities as their British counterparts. This was the only time Rolls-Royce cars were manufactured outside of Great Britain. The American operation closed down in 1931 due to the Depression.

# What's In a Name

I have always been fascinated with automotive logos and badges. This article will present a badge or logo and provide a brief explanation of the item. The source for the following information was derived from information posted on the open sources.



The iconic three point star

The three point Mercedes star is often judged the most recognizable trademark in the world, yet the star device does not date back to the start of the company. Mercedes can trace its origin back to Karl Benz's 1886 Motorwagen, the first gas powered car, and an engineer, Emil Jellinek, who named a car after his

daughter, Mercedes, in 1901. It wasn't until 1926 that Gottlieb Daimler merged his company with Benz. The result became the Mercedes-Benz. Daimler had patented the three point star, which had originated from an 1872 postcard from his father marking the location of their home with a three point star. He combined the star with Benz's laurel wreath used on his first cars.

This strong graphic emblem became the symbol of the prestigious German Marque. At first it was a simple

star decorating radiators. The circular frame came later. Together, the Mercedes-Benz star's 3 points represent the company's drive for universal motorization, but each point also has its individual meaning. The points represent land, sea, and air; environments the company believed they would one day dominate with Mercedes-Benz engines.

From the 1920s onward, however, design chiefs had the brilliant idea of mounting the star in a circle on the front hood. It became an instantly recognizable symbol that lasted until the end of the 20th century, when concerns about the danger of accidents with pedestrians forced a change.

Mercedes models now retain this iconic logo by featuring a large encircled star as an integral part of the design of the front of all models, from the humble A Class hatchbacks and commercial vans to the GT supercar and SL luxury flagships. Some of these grille mounted stars illuminate when the headlights are turned on.



## Car of the Month continued

In the 1980s, the Fire Company changed its livery to white over red in keeping with most southern fire departments. The controls inside the cab were simple. The Seagrave came with a five speed manual transmission. To pump water you had to move a lever on the pump panel from road to pump, depress the clutch and place the transmission in fourth gear. A lock bar would fasten around the shift lever to hold it

in gear while pumping. Pumping a fire engine is a mix of both art and science.

The driver was actually a driver/pump operator. This critical function could get very complex. The operator had to know which hose lines were being used, the diameter of the hoses, the length of the hoses and the pressure of the incoming water. From all this information, the operator could calculate the friction loss within the hose line and determine the pressure that the water had to be pumped at for each line to

ensure enough water reached the hose crew fighting the fire. Too little pressure and not enough water would make it to the fire. Too much pressure and you would knock over your hose team. For a smaller diameter hose, the pump pressure was between 150 and 160 pounds per square inch. As the hose diameter went up, the pressure needed would come down since larger diameter hoses have less friction loss. No matter what the case, fire fighting is a serious workout.

The 1966 Seagrave engine is on display in the Fire Company Museum but is still used to support Fire Company functions such as recruiting, Santa runs at Christmastime, supporting funerals of fallen fire fighters, and various public safety events. The engine was affectionately given the name "Pops" due to its age. This engine has appeared in several Rohr car shows and is treasured by both the Fire Company and Fire Museum.

#### June Presentation continued

1931 was a significant year for Rolls-Royce. In that year it was decided to change the double "R" logo from its traditional red lettering to black. Henry Royce believed the red clashed with some of the different colors his car were painted. He opted for black lettering as it was universally compatible with any color. This change took effect in 1933 fatefully coinciding with Royce's death. In 1931, Royce was knighted by King George V and was dubbed Sir Henry Royce. 1931 also saw the end of automobile production by a company known for its racing prowess, Bentley. Being of equal quality but sportier, Rolls-Royce pursued the purchase of Bentley which was finalized in 1933.

Rolls-Royce continued to manufacture both its own car models and Bentleys up to the beginning of World War II in 1939. With automobile production put on hold, the company concentrated on providing aircraft engines and marine engines. In the late 1930s, they developed the Merlin engine which found its was into some of the most famous wartime aircraft. The Spitfire fighter plane, and Lancaster bombers as well as the U.S. P-51 Mustang all used Merlin engines. Since England was under continual bombing from Germany, many of these engines were produced by Packard in the United States. The Merlin engine was also modified as a marine engine and saw service, most notably, in PT Boats.

Next month will cover the rest of Rolls-Royce history and provide a taste of Rolls-Royce life.

From I-66 (coming from the west): Travel I-66 to Exit 44 - Route 234 By-Pass (Manassas). Drive about 6 miles and make a left at the light onto Business 234 (Dumfries Rd.) Go another 2.5 miles, take a right at the light onto Prince William Street, (before railroad underpass) — follow signs to show car entrance.

From I-66 (coming from the east): Take I-66 to exit 53A and follow Rte. 28 south, 7.8 miles into Manassas. Turn left onto Grant Ave. (Business 234), go under railroad overpass and left onto Prince William Street at first light. Follow sign to show car entrance.

From Prince William Parkway (Dale City / Woodbridge): At Liberia Avenue light (where Parkway makes left turn) continue straight onto Wellington Rd. Go 1.3 miles to Grant Ave., and turn right. Turn right at second light onto Prince William St.; follow signs to show car entrance.

Trailers: Instructions above are for show cars. Trailered cars should enter into the Osbourn High School parking lot off Main Street, just south of Prince William Street. Show cars can then be driven to the show entrance. From Osbourn HS. Make right turn onto Main St and go to Church St, left turn onto Church St, then turn left at the light onto Grant Ave (Business 234) go under the railroad overpass and turn left onto Prince William Street at first light. Follow signs to car show entrance.
