1970 Volkswagen Beetle By Peter W. Pandolfi

Is there anyone who doesn't have a Volkswagen Beetle story? This perky little car spawned from a megalomaniac's vision of a "people's car" garnered a worldwide reputation for reliability, quality, efficiency and affordability. Officially called the Type 1,

its production run began in 1946 and continued to June 2003. While it was designed in the early 1930s by Ferdinand Porsche, the early production were mostly prototype and demonstration vehicles. 

Meeting Minutes

Since the officers and Board of Directors decided to cancel the February, March and April meetings, there will be no meeting minutes. We hope to resume meetings in May given time for people to get their vaccinations for COVID-19.

Car of the Month continued power steering, no power brakes, no power windows, or power anything. Even the engine only had 65 horsepower.

As for specifications, the VW had a 1600 cc engine and four speed floor mounted transmission. The engine was a rear mounted, four cylinder boxer engine and air cooled. The car, weighing in at 1848 pounds,

was 163.16 inches long and 61.56 inches wide with a 96 inch wheelbase. Despite its size, the interior was comfortable with tough vinyl seats, buckets in front and a small bench in the back. The battery was stored under the back seat. Heat? There was effectively none. You could open some floor vents with levers between the front bucket seats, but the all the heat came from the engine and at 20 degrees below zero it took a while for any heat to come out of it. Still my little Bug got me where I needed to go reliably and could still get 28-33 miles per gallon even at speeds over 80 mph. When I bought it the car had a little over 90,000 miles on it.

Driving an air cooled car in South Dakota was unique in winter. South Dakota gets cold in winter; temperatures of 10 to 30 below zero Fahrenheit are not uncommon for weeks at a time. Cars with water

cooled engines had to have block heaters installed to prevent the fluids from freezing. When you parked your car, you had to plug in the heater. There is usu-

ally a plug sticking out of the grill to make this easy. A car with an air cooled engine didn't have to do anything, but I did learn a very valuable lesson. Do not part your VW with the transmission in gear. One morning I set out for work. I went to start the car and let it run to warm up. Unfortunately, I left it in gear and the transmission became frozen. I had to sit

in the subzero temperature until the engine and transmission warmed up enough to allow me to shift into neutral.

Driving to work in the cold was no picnic either. Since there was no cabin heat, I had to drive to the base huddled in my parka with the hood up greatly restricting visibility. Your flesh would freeze in 30 seconds if exposed and it took more than 30 seconds

The following article entitled "<u>It's Not the Cars, It's the Memories</u>" was written by Fred Trusty, AACA Vice President for Membership. It was originally published in the Fall 2020 Rummage Box. I hope you all enjoy it.

At age 14, I got a copy of the Kentucky Drivers Manual. I read it front to back several times and memo-rized all the stopping distances and other important facts. If only I had that much enthusiasm for my school work. On Sunday mornings I would get up and be ready for church long before it was time to leave. My mother would let me back her 1967 Oldsmobile Delmont 88 out of the garage about 10 – 15 minutes before it was time to leave. I would drive it the 200 feet or so down the driveway but I wasn't allowed to go into the street (or at least I didn't get caught) so I would go in reverse all the way back to the garage. Everyone told me that parallel parking was the hardest part of the driving test so I put chalk markings on the asphalt in front of the garage to simulate parking spaces so I could practice parallel parking. A couple of days after my 16th birthday I took the written test and eas-ily passed. Then a couple of months later I took the driv-ing test and after 2 years of parallel parking practice, I could parallel park that Olds blindfolded.

I now had a license to drive but no money for insurance, and gas. Having a car meant no more walking to and from school uphill both ways in the snow, or at least that's what my kids say about me. I could be one of the cool kids at school. I could be somebody. Oh, and let's not forget the biggest motivating factor; girls. But getting a part time job after school meant quitting football. Hmm?

I started work at the Beechmont Key Market making \$1.60/hour. With some money I had saved from cutting grass and a loan from my father, I paid \$500 for a 1965 Ford Custom. The Custom was basically a Galaxy without all the options and trim but for some reason this one was equipped with factory air, automatic, power steering, power brakes, 352 CI engine, and a 4-barrel carburetor.

Cars invoke memories of our younger days. Have you ever noticed that when some people talk about their cars they have a gleam in their eyes? "I had one just like this in high school" or "The first date with my wife was in a car like this?" What are your memories?


I might not have a '65 Ford Custom anymore but I still have the memories. Now think of young people to-day. 20 years from now when they see a car on the show field, are they going to say, "Wow, my first car was a '95 Toyota Corolla. I drove it in high school during the 2020 Covid-19 pandemic." If you see a 90's car on the show field, don't think of it as just a used car. To someone younger, someday it might bring back fond memories.

to drive to work. Fortunately, there is not much traffic in South Dakota. The VW also had no defroster.

There was no fan to push the air even if it got warm. With the condensation from my breathing, the windshield would ice up. Not on the outside but inside! I would drive down the road scrapping the inside of my windshield as I went. One way to easy that was to drive with the window down, but its 20 degrees below zero!

I adjusted and got through all that. The rest of the year, the VW was a hoot to drive. As I was approaching 100,000 miles, the car began running a little rough. I took it to a mechanic to diagnose the problem. My car had a cracked head, cracked cylinder and blown head gaskets. The engine needed to be rebuilt.

thought my car was to become scrap. The the shock of shock. The cost? Just \$200 to completely rebuild the engine. After the work was done, it ran smoother and my gas mileage improved, but generally it drove as it always had. It was an amazingly tough little car. Pam and I with our new baby daughter drove all around western South Dakota in the Bug, and we got to watch the odometer roll over 100,000 miles.

Being a new father, I reasoned that my little car would no longer suit our needs even though we still had the Valiant. In 1977 I decided to sell the car for \$1,000 and bought a 1977 Ford LTD Country Squire station wagon. A little overkill here as the Ford was twice the size of the VW. My Volkswagen went through everything, snow, cold, hail, tornados, etc. but it never failed me. I will always have fond memories of that

WHAT IS "ODMA" and Why Should I Care?

The "Old Dominion Meet Association" (ODMA) formed in 1953 as an organization of AACA Regions in the Commonwealth of Virginia. 15 of the 17 AACA Virginia Regions are members. Every year since 1955, on a rotating basis, a member Region sponsors the ODMA Annual Meet (the only exception being 2020 when it was the Bull Run Region's turn and for obvious reasons it had to be postponed). Because the Roanoke Valley Region had started planning its 2021 ODMA Meet this Spring, Bull Run's turn is now 2022. ODMA has also resumed the tradition of member Regions sponsoring a tour each Fall, again on a rotating basis.

ODMA Meets generally follow AACA Nationals guidelines with respect to vehicle eligibility, classes (including point judging, Historic Preservation and Driver Participation), judging criteria, judging personnel, awards and grille badges. The scoring is a little less rigorous, and there are some special ODMAspecific awards AACA Nationals do not have, such as the Best of Show award, the Driver Participation Award, the Rohr Award for the Region with the largest percentage of its members participating and the Old Dominion Trophy for a Region, calculated by the number of vehicles shown, their accumulated judging scores, number of judges participating, distance traveled, etc. to the Meet. ODMA draws participants from all over Virginia and some border areas of MD, NC and WV, so it is a special opportunity to enjoy vehicles and their owners who may not ordinarily be at our local events

This year's ODMA Meet will be north of Roanoke at the historic Natural Bridge Hotel, adjacent to the Natural Bridge State Park (Virginia's newest) Friday June 11 & Saturday June 12, 2021. Please note your Registration must be postmarked by June 1,

2021. AACA members are invited for the entire Meet, but for those who cannot attend both days the show is Saturday. "Natural Bridge" is an awe-inspiring 'Wonder of the World' too closeby to not see, and there are numerous other nearby points of interest including the zoo, safari, caverns and Pink Cadillac Din-

er. Don't miss the fun!

What's In a Name

I have always been fascinated with automotive logos and badges. This article will present a badge or logo and provide a brief explanation of the item. My primary source for this information is "Car Marques: A Graphic Guide to Automotive Logos and Emblems" by Simon Heptinstall and published by Quintet Publishing.

Oldsmobile is one of America's oldest automobile manufacturers. Founded in Lansing, Michigan by Ransom E. Olds in 1897, Oldsmobiles were producted from 1897 until 2004. There was a variety of early cars powered by steam, electric and gasoline. The most notable of these was the curved dash Olds which was produced from 1901 through 1907. In those years, sales reached over 5,000 units per year but with the advent of bigger and more powerful cars, sales of this venerable one cylinder car began to dwindle. By 1908, the model was dropped altogether. This was also the year that General Motors bought out Oldsmobile placing it in the GM family.

A couple of notable points, after Ransom Olds designed the curved dash Olds the plant suffered a devastating fire that destroyed all the design documents. Ransom was able to rescue only one prototype curved dash Olds and had to reverse engineer the car to recreate the design specs. Upon rebuilding his plant, Ransom introduced a new concept in manufacturing, the assembly line. Sorry, Henry, you only perfected it.

After GM purchased Oldsmobile, Ransom Olds did not leave the automobile manufacturing business. He introduced a line of of cars and trucks under the brand REO, his initials. REO's were built until the mid to late 1920s.

Under General Motors management, Oldsmobiles were produced in various models over the years. The marque eventually ended up as the middle of the GM range of vehicles. The order became from low end to high end, Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Buick and Cadillac. This placement stayed unchanged for decades until GM dropped Oldsmobile in 2004 and Pontiac a few years later.

During World War II, Oldsmobile switched to making munitions for the war effort. After the war, Oldsmobile returned to vehicle production and in 1949 introduced the Rocket V-8 engine. This powerful engine saw great success in NASCAR racing in the 1950s.

As tastes and styles changed so did the company's logo. By 1960, with the space race and success of the Rocket V-8, the company logo changed to a stylized rocket design which carried through until the company's end. Oldsmobile had always made a quality car at a reasonable price. I should know, I have owned five of them. I only wish they were still made today.



2021 Orphan Car Tour

The 2021 Orphan Car Tour, scheduled for Saturday, June 5, will follow a 60-mile circuitous path from Burkittsville, Maryland to Bluemont, Virginia. Along the way, participants will have the opportunity to stop and visit a private collection of 25 cars (1908-1970), an operating grist mill, the Harpers Ferry National Historical Park, an antique auto repair and restoration shop, and several other places of interest. Upon arrival at Bluemont, participants will partake in a buffet dinner. The Tour's nickname this year is "A River Runs Through It", because of the route's several river crossings.

This year's tour is a replay of the 2020 tour which was canceled due to the pandemic. The 2021 event is contingent upon the continued improvement of the coronavirus situation. That situation will be reviewed by Tour officials in mid-April, and a decision to go ahead or cancel will be made at that time.

This will be the 29th Orphan Car Tour, an event designed to encourage the driving enjoyment of antique "orphan" (discontinued-make) vehicles which are at least 25 years old. Each Tour takes place in a different location in the greater Washington-Baltimore area, usually rural, whose low-speed roads are old-car friendly. Participants follow printed directions and travel at their own pace. As many as 64 cars have been driven on past Tours, bearing nameplates that ranged from the familiar (Pontiac, Mercury, Plymouth) to the obscure (Moline-Knight, Flanders and Alvis). The oldest cars ever driven date back to 1912.

The Tour's six sponsors -- all local chapters or regions of national "orphan" car clubs -- are the Chesapeake Bay Chapter of the H-E-T Club, the DeSoto Owners Club of Maryland, the Keystone Region Chapter of the Studebaker Driver's Club (SDC), Mid-Atlantic Packards (a region of The Packard Club), the Potomac Region of the SDC, and The Potomac Ramblers (an affiliate of the AMO and AMCRC clubs).

No hot asphalt here. Our show will be held on a nearly level, well drained field with way more room than we'd ever need. Right nearby is a large hard-surfaced parking lot reserved with ample room for all trailers and towing vehicles. All of this is across the street from the Natural Bridge Hotel.

Things to Do in the Area

A short walk will take you to the bridge and its breath-taking rise above Cedar Creek (Old U.S. Rt. 11 runs right over the bridge.) Walk a bit further and view a lovely waterfall. Admission required.
