After five years at Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, he bought a new green 1950 Chrysler New Yorker just before being transferred to London in early 1950.

This was quite a car even though the styling was a bit conservative. The interior was unique as it was the first car with a padded dash. There was an instrument pod in front of the steering wheel and the rest of the

dash was covered in stunning chrome. Once in England the car was a sensation. Many of the cars on the London streets were pre-war and those built after had the same 1930s look. Most of the post-war cars were tiny like the Morris Minor and Ford Anglia. I had a wonderful time learning to identify British makes like Humber, Riley, Rolls-Royce, Jaguar, and Wolsey. Many times when the Chrysler was parked on the street it would collect a group of spectators. The

Brits had never seen such a large car and said the interior looked like a cocktail lounge. Then Dad got transferred to Frankfurt, Germany where the car continued to draw crowds. It was here that I discovered what a Porsche was when one passed us on the autobahn doing over 80. When dad caught up to it, I thought it said "porch". Later I saw a "Porsche 356" on a street in Frankfurt and was startled to find out it

had a rear engine. I thought I had to have one when I grew up. Well dad learned from another officer at work that there was a custom car company named Spohn in Ravensburg. So in June 1953 off went the Chrysler to Spohn for radical front and rear end custom work. As you can see from the photos, the car went from "stodgy" to "stunning". Now the crowds around the car were even bigger! That year we drove to France to see the Le Mans race and on the way people asked if the car was going to be in the race! Now I had a new challenge learning to spot VWs, Mercedes, Borgwards, BMW Isettas, DKWs, Wan-

derers, and Horchs. Back in the US in 1955, the car continued to stand out and looked even better when Calvert Motors on Lee Hwy repainted it black with a light gray roof.

While not my father's car, it is interesting to note that the headquarters building of the AACA has on display in its entryway another Spohn conversion car.

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The National Beat

The following article entitled "America's Automotive Library Identifies its Oldest Artifacts" was written by Steve Rossi, AACA Vice President—Public Relations and Event Planning. It was originally published in the Winter 2024 Rummage Box.

The Chris & Kathleen Koch AACA Library & Research Center has identified its oldest antique automotive artifact. The collection includes *A Handbook for Steam Users Being Rules for Engine Drivers and Boiler Attendants* by M. Powis Bale, from 1890. In addition, a February 14, 1891, issue of *Scientific American* features an analysis of the 3- wheeled Butler Petrol-Cycle from Great Britain.

According to Library Director Jen Wolfe, "Since automotive history is an inexact science, trying to pinpoint the first piece of automotive material ever published is impossible...though Duryea is credited with producing the first American automobile in series by 1896." Some believe that Panhard began producing promotional literature...in color...during 1892 (from Panhard & Levassor: Pioneers in Automobile Excellence, by David Beare). Which the AACA artifacts predate.

The Smithsonian's Smith Hempstone Oliver contended that the first automotive catalog appeared in 1888/1889, from Philadelphia's Moto-Cycle Manufacturing Company which featured Lucius D. Copeland-designed steam cycles and steam carriages. Along with typewriters (*The Bulb Horn*, May-June 1966). Either way, as a function of the publication timeline above, "America's Automotive Library" is at the forefront.

The AACA Library & Research Center was established in 1977 and houses some 3+ million individual automotive artifacts at its Hershey, PA headquarters, and is the largest and most comprehensive institution of its kind. In addition, the Library also oversees nine single-marque collections within its climate controlled, secure and professionally managed facility which includes a state of the art fire suppression system.

The Library is free and open to the public. Research requests are included with AACA membership (for the first two hours at no charge, per year), while additional photo-copies, scans and reproductions are further available for a fee. Donations such as literature, books, artwork, manuals, periodicals, toys/models, etc. are welcomed and encouraged. Upon receipt of

materials, the Library will pro-vide the donor with a letter acknowledging the gift.

What's In a Name

This article presents a badge or logo and provides a brief explanation of the item. The source for the following information was derived from the book "Car Marques" by Siimon Heptinstall and embellished by my personal experiences..

On September 1, 1933, Toyoda Automatic Loom Works, named after its founder's surname, Kiichiro Toyoda, established a division for the manufacture of automobiles--the forerunner of today's Toyota Motor Corporation. The original "TOYODA" trademark was registered by the company on July 27, 1935, and used on cars and other vehicles produced by the department. Therefore, this original "TOYODA" logo was used on vehicles produced before Toyota Motor Corporation was officially founded, including the Toyota AA/AB/AC and G1 trucks.

In July 1936, the automobile department of the Toyoda Automatic Loom Works, Ltd. (today's Toyota Industries Corporation) celebrated the completion of its first passenger car by holding a public design competition for the Toyoda logo. At the selection meeting held on September 25, a design featuring Japanese



characters for Toyota ($\vdash \exists \not \ni$) surrounded by a circle was chosen among some 27,000 entries sent in from all over Japan.

There were four reasons why "Toyota" was preferred to "Toyoda" in the corporate mark:

- 1. In terms of commercial design, Japanese characters for "Toyota" were visually simpler and less cluttered; the name also sounded more pleasant to the ear.
- 2. The number of strokes to write Japanese characters, called "jikaku," is also a factor. Eight strokes are believed to be connected to wealth and good fortune, and "Toyota" (トヨタ) contains exactly eight strokes.
- 3. Since "Toyoda" literally means "fertile rice paddies", changing the name also prevented the company from being associated with old-fashioned farming.
- 4. Departure from the Toyoda name also implied the company's growth from a family business into the expansion of a small independent company to a larger corporate enterprise.

On August 28, 1937, the Toyota Motor Company was officially established, after Kiichiro Toyoda, the company's founder, successfully trademarked the newly formed word "Toyota." And it formally transferred this business from the Toyoda Automatic Loom Works to the new entity on September 29, 1937.

The 1958 Toyota logo was a significant departure from the previous logos used by the company. The developers removed the geometric shapes from the emblem and made the inscription in English. The result was a concise trademark: the black word "Toyota" on a white background, with strokes of letters of uneven thickness and long narrow serifs at the ends. The lettering was executed in a bold serif typeface, similar to fonts like Times New Roman and Nimbus Roman Japanese Bold, which had clean yet elegant lines that reflected the characteristics of the brand. The clean and simple design of the logo made it easy to recognize and memorable, which is why it remained in use for several years. It helped to establish the brand's identity in the American market and has since become the original version of the company's wordmark.

TOYOTA

In 1969, Toyota made significant changes to its logo. The style of the wordmark was changed to a sans-

serif font, similar to Hypersans Heavy but slightly narrowed, and written in black. By simplifying the lines of the logo, Toyota aimed to achieve a more modern and progressive look. The new logo was not drastically different from the previous one. The font choice shifted to the classic Helvetica, known for its straight lines, clear geometric shapes, and lack of serifs. The characters in the wordmark were closely spaced, with the "Y" letter appearing to rest on two "O" letters on the sides.

In 1978, Toyota underwent another logo change and returned to its bright red and white color scheme. The wordmark used in this logo is similar to the one used today. The font used in the 1978 logo is similar in




style to the previous one, but with a reduced height and greater spacing. This change likely helped to improve the legibility of the logo and make it more visually appealing. Overall, the 1978 logo change was an important moment in Toyota's branding history, as it helped to establish the look and feel of the Toyota wordmark that we know today.

The first iconic oval emblem was introduced in October 1989, and the logo was to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the company. Since then, the logo has remained largely unchanged, with only minor modifications to the font and color scheme over the years. The logo is comprised of three ellipses.

The three ovals in the Toyota logo are arranged in a horizontally symmetrical configuration and represent different elements. The two perpendicular ovals inside the larger oval represent the heart of the customer and the heart of the company, which overlap to represent a mutually beneficial relationship and trust between each other. This is a powerful symbol that speaks to Toyota's commitment to building strong relationships with its customers and stakeholders. The overlapping of the two perpendicular ovals in-

side the outer oval also forms the letter "T" for Toyota, as well as a steering wheel representing the vehicle itself. This is a clever and effective way to incorporate the company's name and product into the logo design. The outer oval symbolizes the world that embraces Toyota, which is a nod to the company's global reach and impact. The different stroke thicknesses in each oval are also a reference to traditional



Japanese brush art, which is a nice touch that reflects Toyota's cultural heritage. Finally, the space in the background within the logo represents the infinite values that Toyota wishes to convey to its customers, including superb quality, value beyond expectation, the joy of driving, innovation, and integrity in safety, the environment, and social responsibility. This is a powerful message that speaks to Toyota's commitment to excellence and its broader social and environmental responsibilities as a global corporation.

Did You Know?

Ford Motor Company is credited with making the first pickup truck, the 1917 Ford Model TT. While the original Ford Model T could be modified to add a cargo box, the 1917 Model TT chassis was built to haul heavier loads, with a sturdier frame and a one-ton rating. They were shipped to dealers in crates. The new owners had to go to the dealers to get them, thus they had to "pick up" the trucks. If you wanted to put a bed on the body, you would have to





build it yourself using the shipping create or have another company install one. The Ford Model TT cost \$600 and sold 209 units in the first year of production. By 1928, that number escalated to over 1.3 million trucks sold. Although this wasn't a conventional pickup by today's standards, the Ford 1917 Model TT represents the beginning of American truck history.






