Part of Waynesboro-Staunton Region History is For Sale

Hyde Kerr, one of the founding members of our Region was active in the early 1950's, often driving a 1907 Schacht High Wheeler on club events. Bill Kerr, a former member of our Region inherited the car from Hyde, his father. We recently learned that Bill had passed away and his sons would like to sell the car, preferably to one of our members to preserve the history of the car. This car was displayed at the Natural Bridge Museum for years and then returned to Staunton where I photographed it in 2007. The car reportedly ran at that time and has been stored in a Staunton garage since then. There were only 618 Schachts built in 1907 so it is a rare car.
