# **Car of the Month 2009 Nissan Maxima SV**

It was a steamy August 2009 day in the City of Manassas, Virginia. My 1996 Mercedes-Benz C220 had failed the state mandated emissions test, and my Mercedes mechanic told me that the cost to repair the engine to meet the standards was going to run more than the car was worth. The little car with 153,576 miles had served me well over the past couple of years and seemed to be running fine. But you can't fight City Hall, so I traded it in for this 2009 Nissan Maxima.

The Maxima styling was all new for 2009 and presented a more aggressive look than the previous model. Nissan promoted it as a sports sedan, which was accurate if you have a loose definition of sports sedan. It was relatively nimble and had plenty of power. It even came with paddle shifters, which though fun proved useless. Not that they didn't work, but with all the cars power, 295 horse-power, you just didn't need them. After all, the car only weighed in at 3,565 lbs. It did a respectable, but not blistering, 0-60 mph in 5.8 seconds and could do the quarter mile in 14.5 seconds reaching 99 mph.

#### Car of the Month continued

My car was powered by a 3.5 liter V-6 engine, which was the only engine option. It also came with a continuously variable transmission (CVT) that moved through the gears with absolutely no detectable indication. Although this transmission was criticized at the time, I found it delightful and highly reliable. The car itself was 190.6 inches long, 73.2 inches wide, slightly wider than previous models, and 57.8 inches high, slightly lower than previous models. This gave the car a more sleek appearance adding to its sports sedan claim. The wheelbase was 109.3 inches.

My Maxima was an SV edition, which was the top-of-the-line model. As Nissan's flagship car, the large Nissan Armada SUV was billed at the flagship of Nissan, it came with all the bells and whistles of the day. Here is the litany of extras on this car: power steering, 4-wheel power disc brakes, power windows and door locks, automatic CVT with paddle shifters, dual moon roof, heated and cooled front seats, memory seats, power heated side mirrors, xenon headlights, leather and wood trimmed interior, intelli-

gent key entry and push to start button. Let me expand on the intelligent key entry. This was not your typical remote entry key fob. You never had to touch the fob, just have it in your pocket or purse. As you

approached the car, the doors automatically unlocked and once seated in the driver's seat you just push the start button. The fob never left my pocket.

#### **Meeting Minutes**

The monthly meeting of the Bull Run Region was held on October 13, 2024 at the VFW Hall in Manassas. This was also our first potluck dinner meeting. 13 members were in attendance.

- 1. Treasurer's Report: Read and accepted.
- 2. Pete remarked that the Region added six new members at the Rohr Show. He had hoped some of them would have attended the meeting. He will reach out to them as a reminder. He then reminded everyone to get their membership renewals in to Dave Claveloux. He stated that all the officer ballot positions have been filled but anyone still interested in running for an office should tell him now.
- 3. Ernie Newland informed the member about the Manassas Christmas Parade to be held on December 7 and encouraged everyone to attend.
- 4. There was no new information on ODMA The Fall Tour will be held on November 7-10 in the Richmond/Ashland area of Virginia.
- 5. Pete stated that Chip Rohr had notified him that the City Tavern, the location for the awards dinner, may be going out of business on January 1. Nicki will check into this. In the meantime, several alternatives were discussed with having either a catered dinner or potluck at the VFW being favored. No action will be taken until Nicki confirms the availability of the City Tavern.
- 6. The remainder of the meeting concerned the results of the Rohr Show. Gene Gilkey and Randy Higgins informed everyone that the turnout of show cars was down this year with only 96 cars being present. Various reasons for this were discussed such as the increased price, getting the word out and the weather. While it was generally believed the weather was the major cause, the other areas will be explored for next year. Nicki reported that it appears the Region made a profit on the show, a final figure will not be available until all bills are in and registration money is received from the online service. In general, the feedback was positive from attendees. The issues experienced in the 2023 show appear to have been corrected. Pete mentioned that the Crusin-For-Heroes people raised over \$1,000 for the Fisher House, which is consistent with past years. Pete informed the group that Robert Hahn of Birmingham Green, a local nursing home and assisted liv-

ing facility, told him that the show was great and very professionally put on. He asked if the Region would be interested in putting on a car show in May 2025 at Birmingham Green that they would use as a fund raiser. There was much discussion about the amount of work involved. The Region opted to not support the proposed show, but several members volunteered their assistance in helping the Birmingham Green people put on their own show. Pete will inform Mr. Hahn. Lastly, Gene Gilkey said he was approached by Mark Olsen, President of Historic Manassas Inc., on the idea of returning to the city's old town area for the car show. Apparently there is some interest among the business owners of old town to see us return. Gene said he would bring up the issue with the Region membership. In discussion, the members said they would consider moving back, but several things needed to happen before making such a move. We would require a multi-year agreement in writing similar to what we have with the Masonic Lodge. Also, the city representatives need to come to one of our meetings with their proposal to get us back. The members authorized Gene to get back to Mark, relay our thoughts, and make arrangements for the city presentation. He is also going to caution Mark that time is very short as a decision would need to be made soon if we were to change for 2025.

- 7. Nicki Hudson won the 50/50 raffle.
- 8. There being no other business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned.



The radio in this car was an AM/FM/Satellite Bose stereo system with an iPod connection, flashcard port and its own 9 gigabyte hard drive for storing your favorite playlists.

The system also included a navigation system and Bluetooth phone connection. The center armrest in the back seat also came with a set of radio controls for the rear seat passengers to make adjustments. My granddaughter Torie, who was 5 years old at the time, loved having her own control panel. She also greatly enjoyed the rear window sun shade. At the touch of a button, a window shade would rise from the rear deck and block the sun from streaming in through the back window onto the rear seat passengers.

## What's In a Name

This article presents a badge or logo and provides a brief explanation of the item. The information in this article was derived from the book "Car Marques: A Graphic Guide to Automotive Logos and Emblems" by Simon Heptinstall.

One of the United Kingdom's classic marques was founded by German immigrant Siegfried Bettmann. The former sewing machine salesman founded Triumph in 1885 in London started making bicycles in 1889. He then branched into motorcycles, and finally cars in 1921. The elegant 10/20 was Triumph's first four-wheeler, followed by the Super Seven. In 1936, financial difficulties led to the car and motorcycle businesses being separated. Triumph cars of this era were distinguished by a badge featuring the company name written across a blue and red globe.



Triumph was bought by the Standard Motor Company in 1944 and the subsidiary company evolved into a sportier brand. Cars were badged with globes, winged motifs, or the striped shield of Standard. The TR series of sports cars started its 30-year run, ending with the TR 8 in 1981.

By the 1980s, Triumph had become assimilated into the British Leyland empire. The cars were given hood badges that were simply the company name in capital letters. The stylish Stag convertible wore a special stag badge and later Triumphs received a new emblem: the Triumph name surrounded by a laurel wreath on a black roundel.

Triumph made many different models of automobiles. Their best known, especially in the United States, were TR 3, TR 6, TR 7, Spitfire and Stag. All these had either a four or six cylinder engine except for the Stag which had a small V-8. As with most British cars, they were temperamental, but when they were in tune, they were tons of fun to drive.

All this badge tinkering failed to save the marque, however. Its last model was the Acclaim sedan, which was a Honda Ballade remarketed with a Triumph badge. Finally, in 1984 the shrinking Austin Rover Group retired the Triumph marque. The name came into the hands of BMW in 1994 when it bought Rover Group, although it hasn't appeared on a car since this time.

Car of the Month continued just three short years, the Maxima was wrecked. I

was proceeding through and intersection with the green light when a Chevy Colorado pickup truck decided to run the red light and turn across in front of me. I am sure he did not see me coming up the right hand lane and I did not see him due to the left lane traffic. I broadsided him at 35 mph smashing in the front end of the Maxima and setting off the airbags. Despite the damage, I was still able to drive the car to the side of the road. The truck was not so lucky. The impact sheared off the entire rear suspension of




Spacious trunk with cargo net



In addition to bells, they offer a full-service non-ferrous foundry. Sandmolding, lost-wax are two techniques Sunderlin can cast with any alloy.

A "WHALE" OF A DISCOVERY was found in the Martin Marietta Carmel Church Quarry in 1990. The first bones found included neck vertebrae dating from 14 million years ago and were excavated in 1991-2. More than 50% of the skeleton was recovered, making it one of the most complete fossilized whales discovered in the Eastern United States. The whale was identified as a new species from that period, based on the difference in ear bones.
