2009 Nissan Rogue SL

Since its introduction in October 2007 as a 2008 model, the Rogue has been mainstay in the Nissan lineup. This vehicle was called a crossover vehicle, the transition between a car and SUV, but is now classified as a compact SUV. It became the Nissan entrylevel SUV. One step up from the Rogue was its cousin, the Nissan Murano, which was basically the same vehicle with a larger cabin and a V-6 cylinder engine. Now in 2025, the Murano is long gone and the Rogue continues to set sales records.

By 2009, my wife, Pam, and I were at a crossroads, vehicle wise. I was driving our big Nissan Armada, Clutch Chatter COM January 2023, and she was driving the 1998 Volkswagen Jetta purchased by us new then sold to my father then inherited back to us in 2008, Clutch Chatter COM October 2021. We decided to reset our transportation configuration and proudly walked into her Nissan dealership to purchase two cars, a 2009 Nissan Maxima, Clutch Chatter COM November 2024, and this 2009 Nissan Rogue all-wheel drive, both in red.

Car of the Month continued

Our Rogue was the top of the line model, as was the Maxima, so it came with everything available on a Rogue. It was powered by a 2.5L four cylinder engine making 170 horsepower. This was the only engine available on the Rogue. The engine was paired with Nissan's CVT, continuous variable transmission, the same as the Maxima. It had the standard power steering, power brakes, four wheel disc antilock, paddle shifters, and power windows. Being the

SL model, our Rogue also came with heated leather seating, intelligent keyless entry, push-button start, AM/FM/SAT Bose stereo system, navigation system, Bluetooth phone connection and a moon roof. The sticker price was \$29,715 and we traded in the Jetta on the car.

The Rogue was not overly big, but had adequate room inside for passengers and groceries. The vehi-

cle was 183 inches long, 71 inches wide, and 65 inches high with a wheelbase of 106 inches. The Rogue

tipped the scales at 3,529 pounds. The interior provided 97.5 cubic feet of passenger space and 28.9 cubic feet of cargo space. This was the ideal car for Pam, who did not like driving large vehicles, giving her the more upright commanding view of a truck and the size and comfort of a car. It was a little underpowered, however, as we found out during several family trips.



The monthly meeting of the Bull Run Region was held on December 15, 2024 at the VFW Hall in Manassas. This was a potluck dinner meeting and annual Christmas Cookie Exchange. 20 members were in attendance.

- *1.* Pledge of Allegiance. After the Pledge, Pete invited the membership to partake in the food for the potluck dinner.
- 2. Treasurer's Report: Read and accepted.
- 3. Pete introduced new member Mark Olsen and his friend Stacy to the membership. Mark has an extensive collection of antique cars, motorcycles and fire trucks. He then reminded everyone to get their membership renewals in to Dave Claveloux ASAP. Pete encouraged the membership to sign up for the Awards Dinner on January 12, 2025. This is a great time to socialize and an opportunity to honor those members who did so much for the Region over the year. Pete stated that he received in the mail a request from AACA Headquarters to help fund the liability insurance for AACA officers to include Regional officers. He explained that this request is made every year and Bull Run has always contributed to it. A motion was made and passed to contribute \$110 to the insurance fund.
- 4. Pete next informed the membership on the results of the 2025 officer election. As none of the candidates were opposed in the election, all were duly elected to their respective positions. He, Gene Gilkey and new member Mark Olsen of Historic Manassas (HMI) attended the meeting/inspection. It was determined that the City will provide Prince William St. from Main St. to Grant Ave., West St. and Battle St. from Center St. to Prince William St. plus the commuter parking lot on West St. and the parking lot for the train station. This is the same footprint for the show as in the past minus the lawn of the Manassas Museum. The museum lawn presents a

number of complications and will not be used. The Region will be responsible for none of the City fees, which will be handled through HMI. A five-year written agreement was presented that stipulated the above facts. HMI will also assist with publicizing the event. Discussion around the proposal centered that old town Manassas is the best venue for our show and would provide increased foot traffic and better access to sponsors. The show field is more than capable of handling up to 200 cars. A motion was made to move the show back to old town Manassas which passed with a unanimous vote. Pete and Mark signed the agreement on behalf of their respective organizations. It was further decided to have a new, updated version of our banner for display across Center St. the week before the show. The Masonic Lodge will be informed of this action per the agreement with them.

- 6. Nicki Hudson won the 50/50 raffle.
- 7. Pete thanked all the members who brought food for the potluck and invited those participating the cookie exchange to go get their cookies. He then wished everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.
- 8. Adjourned. 🥶

Martin Luther King Jr. Day

Officially the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. is a federal holiday in the United States observed on the third Monday of January each year. King was chief spokesperson for nonviolent activism in the Civil Rights Movement, which protested racial discrimination in federal and state law and civil society. President Ronald Reagan signed the holiday into law in 1983, and it was first observed three years later on January 20, 1986. Railway up in the mountains, necessitating the two cars. Pam, driving the Rogue, found the paddle shifters useful several times as the Rogue struggled to climb some of the hills. With all the Maxima's power, I never had that issue. Still the trip was pleasant and we had no issues. If you have never been to Cass, I highly recommend it. It is an old logging camp using Shay steam locomotives to take visitors up and down the mountain. The other great thing is

that it is right next to the Greenbank Radio Telescope and therefore there is no cell service or wifi in the area to prevent interference with the telescope's reception. Three days of uninterrupted bliss.

While Pam thoroughly enjoyed the Rogue, there were a few features she did not care for. When you folded

down the rear seats to increase the cargo area, the cargo floor did not lay flat. There was also a gap between the non-removable headrests of the rear seats and the back of the front seats so things invariably fell through the crack. Even if the headrests could be removed, the crack would still have existed only completely across the cargo area. At least the slope of the floor angled away from the crack. Another aspect of the cargo area she did not like was the lack of a roof light. I guess no car is perfect.

Pam used this car until 2016. Her health was declining and she needed more accommodations to aid her with her driving. We leased a 2016 GMC Acadia that had all the driving assist features in it such as a backup camera, vehicle detection system, and lane warning system. We did not, however, get rid of the Rogue really. Instead, we sold it to our son Phillip who used it all the way to 2023 when he lost control skidding on some ice and hit a Jersey wall barrier. This unfortunately totaled the reliable Rogue, which my son, who is six foot four inches and 320 pounds, also truly loved. I know this car will always have a place in our hearts.

What's In a Name By Peter W. Pandolfi

This article presents a badge or logo and provides a brief explanation of the item. The information in this article was derived from open sources on the internet.

The ZiL company was founded in 1916 by the State government. The factory had been founded just before the Revolution of 1916, but it took eight years of upheaval before it built its first vehicle, a truck, in 1924. The marque really made it name by producing armored limousines for Soviet leaders. Cars ranged from the one and a half gallon prewar ZIS-101 used by Stalin, to the ZiL-4104 open-top model used in the May Day parades in Red Square until the early part of the 21st century. The two gallon ZiL-4104 of the 1970s had one of the world's biggest passenger car engines. *Editor's Note: When looking at the displacement in gallons, think of how many liters go into a gallon. Approximately 4 liters per gallon.*



Only a few dozen ZiL cars were produced annually. These cars had prices equivalent to Rolls –Royces, but lacked the matching engineering finesse. In the mid to late 1940s, as part of the WWII compensation, the U.S. government required Packard to turn over their design specifications, which carried through to the mid-1950s.

Some main roads in Moscow feature a special lane for senior government officials to drive along without being hindered by normal traffic. Locals call these "ZiL lanes". ZiL is an acronym that stands for Zavod Imeni Likhachova. The Likhachova factory in Moscow was a major manufacturer of military vehicles, buses, trucks and luxury cars for the political elite.



The brand's badges seem mysterious to non-Russian speakers, but it simply represents the company initials in the Cyrillic alphabet. These initials are usually portrayed against a rectangular frame, either as a blue badge or as a mascot mounted on the top of the hood. This logo in its various design forms has remained unchanged throughout the company's existence.
