## The Car is the Star

The Avengers presented here are not the popular, costumed super-heroes of both movies and animation that we know now in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. It was actually a British TV show brought to the United States in the mid-1960s. The show featured two secret agents in Her Majesty's service, who investigated and thwarted a variety of criminals intent on creating havoc in the British government.

The show revolves around the exploits of Mr. John Steed, played by Patrick Mcnee, and his partner, Mrs. Emma Peel, played by Diana Rigg, and later Ms. Tara King, played by Linda Thorson. As agents for the British government, Steed was usually dressed in

a proper three-piece suit complete with bowler hat and umbrella. Mrs. Peel was dressed in the latest fashions of the 1960s, such as miniskirts and boots. For the action scenes she was often dressed in a skintight catsuit that allowed her to display her karate skills. Tara King usually wore mini dresses.

Although recordings of the second and third seasons were seen in Canada as early as 1963, these seasons of The Avengers were not broadcast on television in the United States. The American Broadcasting Company (ABC) purchased the rights to broadcast seasons

4 and 5 in the United States in 1965. The Avengers became one of the first British series to be aired on prime-time U.S. television. The ABC network paid the then-unheard-of sum of \$2 million for the first 26 episodes. The average budget for each episode was reportedly £56,000, which was high for the British industry. The fourth season aired in the U.S. from March to the beginning of September 1966. The show was broadcast in the United States at 10 pm since the U.S. censors considered the show to be too violent and not suitable for children.

Female partner Mrs. Emma Peel debuted in October 1965. The name of the character derived from a comment by writers, during development, that they wanted a character with "man appeal". In an early attempt to incorporate this concept into the character's name, she was called "Samantha Peel", shortened to the awkward "Mantha Peel". Eventually, the writers began referring to the idea by the verbal shorthand "M. Appeal", which gave rise to the character's ultimate name.

The show carried the basic format: Steed and his associate were charged with solving the problem in the

space of a 50-minute episode, thus preserving the safety of 1960s Britain. There is a light, comic touch in Steed's and Mrs. Emma Peel's interactions with each other and their reactions to other characters and situations. The show parodied its American contemporaries with episodes such as "The Girl From AUNTIE", "Mission... Highly Improbable" and "The Winged Avenger" (spoofing The Man from U.N.C.L.E., Mission: Impossible and Batman, respectively).

At the end of the fifth series in 1967, Diana Rigg left to pursue other projects. When Diana Rigg left the series in October 1967, the British network executives decided that the current series formula, despite resulting in popular success, could not be pursued further. The director signed his then-girlfriend, 20-year-old newcomer Linda Thorson, as the new fe-

male co-star and chose the name Tara King for her character. Linda Thorson played the role with more



## Meeting Minutes

The monthly meeting of the Bull Run Region was held on November 9, 2025 at the Manassas VFW Hall at 4 pm. 22 members were present.

1. The Treasurer's Report was read and accepted. Profits from the Rohr show were down this year.
2. For Show and Tell, Randy told the group of his pleasant experience at the Brandy Station car show. He said it was a well organized show and had a large number of cars on display. He also attended the Trunk or Treat event at the Manassas Post 10 of the American Legion. Pete Pandolfi related the experience he had on November 8 at the Old House Winery and Brewery in Culpeper. This Veterans' Day event was participated in by the Crusin-For-Heroes group and attracted 3,000 to 3,500 people. This is a big event to raise money for the Fisher House military charity. Pete displayed his Rolls-Royce with a display of memorabilia from his father and father-in-law from World War II as well as items from his career in the U.S. Air Force.
3. President's Report: Randy complemented everyone on the great turn out for this meeting. Randy told the members that he and his wife, Liz, have opened an antique booth in Catlett, so come on by and see what is available. Randy stated that he has some 17 inch tires available that he received from the purchase of his new old pickup truck.
4. Secretary Report: Pete reported that he has received several election ballots in the mail. Members have until the next meeting to send in their votes.
5. With nothing more to be said about the 2025 show, Pete told the members that preparations are being made for the 2026 Rohr show. Bill is working to get as many vehicles that attended the first car show to be on display for the 2026 show marking 50 years. The Manassas Volunteer Fire Company Museum will display their 1929 fire engine that was at the first show.
6. Regarding the National Convention in 2026, Randy reported that we will provide two vehicles to display at the Trade Show this year. Also on the last day of the convention, the Region is invited to put on a mini-show of about 14 cars in front of the hotel. The Region will have a table at the Trade Show and we will need people to staff it. Randy will poll the membership to determine whether the Region would want to reserve a room at the hotel to support our operations at the convention. Please let him know if you are planning to attend. As a bonus, Randy will be giving a presentation on the Mayberry Sheriff's squad car so be sure to sign up for that.
7. The ODMA Fall Tour will be held on November 20-23 in Orange, VA and will include Montpelier and other points of interest. Franklin handed out flyers for the tour.
8. Ernie Newland reminded everyone that the Manassas Christmas parade is on December 6. Chairman Ernie Newland stated that our lineup position is the same as previous years on Carriage Lane in Manassas and show time is 8 am.
9. Old Business: It was decided that the Manassas First Friday events will be added to the Bull Run calendar for next year. We plan on attending in April, June, August, September and perhaps November. Pete said he has received some feedback on the meal menu for the Awards Dinner. So far the favored one is the Italian meal with BBQ a close second. A show of hands was taken at the meeting with 11 votes for the Italian meal, 8 votes for the BBQ and 3 votes for the high end meal. A decision will be made in December so let Pete know your preferences. The menus are on page 12 of this issue. Nicki made a motion that the Region subsidize the members' cost by \$10 per meal. Seconded by Dave Claveloux the motion passed by unanimous vote.
10. New Business: Randy was approached by the President of the Fredericksburg Region with a proposal that we partner with them and other surrounding Regions to host a National Show in 2027. After some discussion, Randy said he would contact Wally to get more specific information. Randy also stated that members go to a number of shows throughout the year that are not on our calendar. If you know of a show in the area, let him or Pete know and we will get the word out to the membership. Lastly, Jim and Sally Batchelder will take care of the set up for the Awards Dinner and Nicki will get door prizes.
11. Ernie Newland won the 50/50 raffle and a gift card from Manassas Olive Oil Co. The meeting adjourned at 5:25 pm.

innocence in mind, and, unlike the previous partnerships, the writers allowed subtle hints of romance to blossom between Steed and Tara King.

Diana Rigg filmed a farewell scene for Emma that appeared as the tag scene of the episode. It was explained that Emma's husband, Peter Peel, was found alive and rescued, and she left the British secret service to be with him. Emma visits Steed to say goodbye, and while leaving she passes Tara on the stairway giving the advice that "he likes his tea stirred anti-clockwise". Steed looks out of the window as a departing Emma enters the Bentley driven by Peter, who from a distance seems to resemble Steed (and

was played by Steed's regular stunt double, with bowler hat and umbrella).

The cars used in the series became almost as famous as the actors. From the 4th season on, Steed's signature cars were six vintage, green 1926–1928 Bentley racing or town cars, including Blower Bentleys and Bentley Speed Sixes (although, uniquely, in "The Thirteenth Hole" he drives a Vauxhall 30-98). In the final seasons, he drove two yellow Rolls-Royces – a 1923 Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost and a 1927 Rolls-Royce Phantom I. Peel drove Lotus Elan convertibles (a white 1964 and a powder blue 1966), which, like her clothes, emphasized her independence and vitality. During the first Peel series (Season 4), each episode ended with a short, humorous scene of the duo leaving the scene of their most recent adventure in some unusual vehicle. Mother, the secret service director, occasionally appeared in a silver Rolls-Royce. Tara King drove an AC 428 and

a Lotus Europa.

The revised series continued to be broadcast in the US. The episodes with Linda Thorson as Tara King proved to be highly rated in Europe and the United Kingdom. However, in the U.S., the ABC network

chose to air it opposite the number one show in the country at the time, Rowan and Martin's Laugh-In. Steed and Tara King could not compete, and the show was cancelled in the U.S. in 1969. Without the financial backing of ABC, production of the British version of the show shut down as well.

## What's In a Name

*This article presents a badge or logo and provides a brief explanation of the item. The information in this article was derived from open internet sources and Simon Heptinstall's book "Car Marques", 2018 by QUARTO Publishing.*

**Pagani Automobili S.p.A.** (commonly known as **Pagani**) is an Italian manufacturer specializing in high-performance sports cars and advanced carbon fiber components. Founded in 1992 by Argentine-Italian engineer and entrepreneur Horacio Pagani, the company is headquartered in San Cesario sul Panaro, near Modena, Italy.

The brand gained global recognition with its debut model, the Pagani Zonda, followed by the critically acclaimed Pagani Huayra and the latest Pagani Utopia. Pagani's cars often feature a V12 engine developed in collaboration with Mercedes-AMG.

Pagani's first model, the Zonda, is powered by a mid-mounted DOHC V12 engine manufactured by Mercedes-Benz's AMG division producing 669 horsepower. The car's design was inspired by jet fighters and the famous Sauber-Mercedes Silver Arrow Group C cars, and features several unique design elements, including its circular four pipe exhaust system. There were five variants of this model; Zonda, Zonda F, Zonda Cinque (cinque is Italian for the number 5), Zonda Tricolor (produced as a tribute to

the Italian Air Force's aerobatic team the Frecce Tricolori), and Zonda Barchetta. Only three Zonda Barchetta were produced at a cost of \$15 million each.

The Pagani Huayra, the successor to the Pagani Zonda, was initially revealed online in a press release on 25 January 2011. It was officially revealed at the 2011 Geneva Motor Show. The car is named after the Quechua god of wind, Huayra-tata. The engine is a 6.0-litre twin-turbo M158 V12 engine from Mercedes-AMG producing 730 horsepower. The Huay-

ra's body is made from carbonium; a lightweight composition of carbon fiber and titanium. The Huayra has been redesigned from the ground up but shares many visual qualities with its predecessor. The car can accelerate from 0 to 60 mph in 3.2 seconds and has a top speed of 235 mph. Only 100 units of the Huayra were produced, each costing \$1 million without options. There were three variants of the Huayra, the Huayra, Huayra BC and Huayra Roadster. The production for the BC was just 30 units, costing \$2.2 million each. The Roadster was equipped with an improved engine cooling system, standard doors as opposed to gullwing doors, 7-speed manual transmis-

sion, and it is 40% lighter than the coupe. This all combines to yield 754 horsepower from the same engine as the coupe. An additional 100 roadsters were produced at \$2.5 million each. The roadster is said to accelerate at nearly 2 Gs.

I constantly hear excuses such as “there are no events in my area ”or “we need to travel too far to participate in that”. The reason for that is **your Region has not hosted an event.**

Maybe it has been many years since your region has hosted an event. If you are considering hosting, there is assistance available from AACA National. We can provide the guidance you need to host a national event. If financial concerns are holding you back there is some good news. **AACA National Board of Directors has approved a \$5000 grant to any region approved to host a national show that has not hosted for more than 10 years!**

### \$5000 GRANTS AVAILABLE TO REGIONS TO HOST NATIONAL EVENTS THAT HAVE NOT HOSTED FOR OVER TEN YEARS

The AACA National Board realizes that the financial risk involved with hosting a national show or tour has caused many regions and chapters to be hesitant to volunteer to host a national event. Some regions simply do not have the funds available.

At the National Board of directors meeting in Hershey PA 2023, the board approved a \$5000 grant to any region receiving board approval to host a national event that has not hosted one for more than ten years.

There are many opportunities to host one of these events. We have winter nationals available and will schedule up to three years in advance. Spring and Fall National shows are available to schedule for Eastern, Southeastern, Central and Western Divisions, also up to 3 years in advance.

Touring Events share the same opportunities. Founders Tour, Sentimental Tour, Vintage Tour, Reliability Tour, Glidden Tour and all four Divisional tours have available openings for your region to reserve for up to three years in advance. Don’t miss this opportunity to host a national event. Take advantage while the national board has this offer open! For more information, contact Greg Jackson, your 2025 for VP National Activities.



### What's in a Name continued

The successor to the Huayra, named Utopia, was revealed on 12 September 2022. A total of 99 examples of the closed coupé model are planned, with open and track variants possible in the future. All 99 coupés are already assigned to the customers. The first car was delivered in October 2023. The Utopia uses the same M158 twin-turbocharged V12 engine as the Huayra, designed and built by Mercedes-AMG, but upgraded to produce 852 horsepower. Pagani partnered with Xtrac to develop a 7-speed gearbox that will be mounted transversely, available as a pure manual or an automated manual, and coupled with an electro-mechanical differential by a triple plate clutch.

Pagani customers are not the sort who crave a conservatively designed global logo. The name and performance is generally enough satisfaction. This may explain why the company’s badge design seems a bit mysterious. The word “Pagani” stands in the center of an oval of drilled aluminum with “Automobili Modena” at the bottom. The top left corner has a flash of blue and lines that appear to form the letter “P”. Like every aspect of these hand-built cars, the badge is carefully carved from a solid block of aluminum and takes 24 hours to create.

## ODMA Fall Tour

Each year, in addition to the annual Spring car show, ODMA conducts its Fall Tour. This year the tour ran from November 20 to November 23 and was centered around Orange and Culpeper counties in Virginia.

Three Bull Run members attended the tour, Franklin Gage, Richard Porter with his guest Terese, and myself. In all, the tour involved 18 antique vehicles, 5 modern vehicles and about 30-35 members from AACA Regions throughout Virginia.

The event began on Thursday night at the Round Hill Inn in Orange, VA with a pizza party get together. The next morning, the group headed off to Montpelier, the home of President James Madison. Arriving a little too early, the caravan of cars staged at the old 1910 Montpelier train station until the gates opened. Once inside the facility, the group enjoyed a few hours touring the mansion and the vast grounds.

From Montpelier, the tour headed to Gordonsville, VA for a delicious lunch at the award winning BBQ Exchange restaurant. From there everyone headed about 300 feet across the railroad tracks to tour the Civil War Exchange Hotel. Built in 1860, this museum contains many period artifacts and shows what life was like for travelers in this era. One interesting note: Richards companion Terese grew up in Gordonsville and you could see her home from the parking lot of the hotel./museum.

On the second day, things started out with some light rain, but that did not dampen anyone's experience. The day started at the Museum of Culpeper in downtown Culpeper, VA. Located in the old train station, it is still an operating station for AMTRAK, the museum has on display many items from Culpeper's long history from colonial days to the mid-twentieth century. Not old enough you say! Well, they also have on display fossils discovered in the Culpeper area that date back to the Triassic Era about 215 million years ago. You don't get much older than that. After a lunch break in Culpeper, the group headed to the Belmont Farms Distillery. Located a few miles outside of Culpeper, this distillery produces a wide variety of spirits and has been the location for filming of several TV shows. The tour members were treated to a tour of the distilling process and got to sample some of their products. Not too much, however.

Over all the tour was a pleasant experience with wonderful fellowship among participants. Well planned and executed, even when thrown some curve balls, this tour lived up to the high standards of ODMA
